Young people seek...

- 1. listening that honors,
- 2. formation that feeds,
- 3. finding intersections,
- 4. seeking and finding, and
- 5. liturgy with consequence.

From Age to Age: The Challenge of Worship with Adolescents (2000)



Vibrant worship with adolescents...

- celebrates involvement in the Church's life and mission,
- invites and accepts authentic participation,
- 3. attends to diversity of ages and cultures,
- 4. roots and fosters personal prayer relationship with God,
- 5. includes effective preaching of the Word,
- 6. has a youthful spirit in music and song,
- 7. incorporates visually dynamic symbols and actions, and
- 8. has an interactive and communal dimension.

Growing Young: Six Essential Strategies to Help Young People Discover... (2016)



The six essential strategies are...

- l. unlock keychain leadership,
- empathize with today's young people,
- 3. take Jesus' message seriously,
- 4. fuel a warm community,
- 5. prioritize young people (and families) everywhere, and
- 5. be the best neighbors.

SUMMARY

Our goal is to approach liturgy planning so students:

- engage with the liturgy in real and meaningful ways,
- experience and share responsibility,
- connect the liturgy to real lived experience and issues, and
- put their gifts and interests to work in service to others.



Liturgical Planning Process

Key steps for liturgical planning:

- 1. ensure an inclusive process (ages, cultures, perspectives, etc.)
- 2. start with Scripture reading(s) to be proclaimed
- 3. pray a group form of "lectio divina" to identify focus
- 4. shape ritual or symbols to be used
- 5. select music to support prayer focus

Basic process

- 1. **Listen.** One person will slowly read the Scripture passage out loud. You might find it helpful to close your eyes to help you listen more deeply.
- 2. **Reflect.** Reflect silently on what you heard. What words, phrases, or images stood out most to you?
- 3. **Share.** Spend a few minutes sharing what you reflected on. What stood out to the others in the group? How were these similar to your answer?

Repeat up to three times, narrowing down your reflection (one word, community needs, etc.).

- 4. **Ask.** What theme or focus has begun to emerge? What words, ideas, or images will be important to emphasize?
- 5. **Plan.** Using your reflection and the words, images, themes that emerged, now get about the business of planning. Use this distilled wisdom to write intercessions, select songs and hymns, write prayers, select rituals (if any), prepare the liturgical environment, etc. Provide your notes to the person who will be providing the homily (or reflection, for a prayer service).

Ministerial formation

Key points

- 1. each role requires intentional formation
- 2. formation must be created with a realistic understanding of prior knowledge
- 3. all formation should be on-going and flexible
- 4. formation should provide both logistical training and spiritual formation
- 5. formation should be continual so that no ministry is prepared for ad-hoc
- 6. formation for youth and the greater parish community should mirror one another
